Heritage Angel Awards 2019– Shortlist Announced & Public Vote Now Open

The search for Northern Ireland's Heritage Angels is moving forward with the final Heritage Angel Awards shortlist revealed today. These annual awards aim to celebrate unsung angels of local heritage- individuals or groups, who have rescued an historic building or site, worked as craftsmen or apprentices, or recorded and interpreted a historic place.

The Angel Awards are not just about heritage, but the people that make heritage projects happen. Showcasing what is possible when people take interest in and take action for the care and consideration of our heritage.

Comprising 15 projects across five different categories, the shortlist showcases a range of diverse heritage initiatives across Northern Ireland. The 2019 shortlist includes private owners; volunteers; community groups; apprentices; craftsmen and young people. All of the shortlisted candidates have developed their interest in heritage, in different ways and applied this into quality schemes in Northern Ireland.

The overall winner in each of the categories will be named at the Northern Ireland Heritage Angel Awards ceremony on Tuesday 29 October at the Market Place Theatre, Armagh. This special event will be hosted by Wendy Austin, with special guests, Joe Mahon and Marie-Louise Muir.

The event will also celebrate 'Heritage in Song and Spoken Word'. Local artists will perform bespoke material, specially created for the event, about Armagh's built heritage. This year's fantastic line-up includes: Brigid O'Neill; Tony Villiers; Rioghanch Connolly; The 4 of Us - Brendan & Declan Murphy; Maria McManus and the Armagh Pipers.
